Dakota Stark - Key Points

- (4-5) Parent of Wade
- (9-10) Date of Wade's Death
- (13-16) Wade was a 7th grader playing JV soccer and was very tall for his age
- (22-24) Wade took a big hit at a soccer game, but appeared to DS to be ok
- (27) Coach took team for pizza and then Springs Park for jumping
- (29) Wade wore a long sleeve shirt
- (32) Team traveled on a bus
- (33) DS arrives around 3 pm with 2 year-old child
- (33) Wade had been to Springs Park before, DS had not
- (37-40) DS visited other parks with watcher in every room, video monitors in the snack area, benches outside jump area to observe
- (42) Springs Park more crowded, too many kids
- (45) Against DS better judgment, they stayed
- (48) Familiar with Ex 6
- (56) DS witnessed high school age kids in 2-4 year old section. No watchers or staff there.
- (60) Trampoline dodgeball for older kids
- (64) None of screens with safety warnings were working
- (66) Was asked to sign waiver by SP Staff
- (69) DS asked to read form and SP staff not enough time
- (71) Against "better judgment" signed form, did not get a copy

Dakota Stark - Key Points - Cont'd

- (73) DS can identify Ex 3 Waiver
- (74) Felt rushed, doesn't recall initialing pages, didn't see signs like in Ex 2
- (78) Knew Wade would play dodgeball
- (80) SP walls were glass
- (81) Parents could only sit in vending area, not jumping area
- (84) Saw Wade on the screen "every so often", Jason with DS
- (86) Checked emails and facebook while WS jumping
- (88) Put phone down when heard scream from Dodgeball Zone
- (89) Screen WS had been on had people standing around him.
- (92) Dodgeball zone marked 13 and up
- (93) Wade was 12
- (95) Walked on padded springs to get to Wade
- (103) EMTs put WS in collar, on backboard, in ambulance
- (107-108) DS crushed, irreplaceable part of life taken
- (112)Burying a child is worst thing for parents
- (113-14) DS can identify Ex 5 Cause of death spinal cord severed.
- (119-120) Filed suit after reading Barton's article, retained Barton for lawsuit
- (122) Wants financial penalty, shut down Springs Park
- (123) "They killed our son"

Robin Hill - Key Points

- (1-2) 14 years old, good friends with WS, Meadow Bay
- (7-8) Did things <u>w</u> WS jumped at trampoline parks
- (10 -14) Into trampoline parks, different locations
- (17) Had been to SP with WS several times wout parents
- (21) WS took hard hit at soccer game
- (22) WS went down hard on shoulders, neck and head, bounced back and returned to the game
- (32-3) Large crowd entering SP, screens not working, no waiver, no rules displayed
- (33) RH familiar with Ex 2, Rules, knows the rules
- (34) Safety rules posted in park
- (39-40) Signed waiver, got wristband. No one read forms. Doesn't know anyone who reads forms.
- (42) Signed own waiver, wrote age as 13, only 12
- (43) Got a blue wristband for 13 and over crowd
- (47) SP staff let them get away with things that other places do not
- (50) Dodgeball zones always very aggressive
- (52) Times when no watchers in 13+ Dodgeball, made it a "free for all".
- (53) Staff would egg them on to throw harder or jump higher.
- (54) Never saw anyone checking wristbands when going into different trampoline areas
- (57-60) Areas are coded by color and match assigned wristband, doesn't recall seeing those rule enforced
- (64) WS was a great athlete

Robin Hill - Key Points

- (69) WS wanted to go in 13+ room, wristband was red
- (71) RH knew WS had wrong wristband, done it before
- (72) WS wearing long sleeve shirt to cover wrists
- (73) No SP people asked about wristband or seemed to notice; staff did not seem to care
- (77) Knew things were going to be rough be rough in 13+
- (79) Two watchers there, one soon left did not return
- (81) One watcher, people trying to "kill each other"
- (82-85) JB stepped in, not trying to keep the peace. Encouraged kids to throw harder, knock other kids down
- (90) Rules say not to intentionally hit someone in head
- (92) Kid hit so hard flipped backwards, landed on back
- (94-95) Huge, big guy won game, football player/college
- (103) Dodgeball a free-for-all
- (104) WS stayed where the mats cover the springs
- (107) Watcher saw everything that happened, no positive of negative statements made
- (109) RH can identify Ex 6
- (110) Wade was smallest of five in Dodgeball
- (119-121) Wade hit in left shoulder, lost balance, yelled as he fell, head and neck hit back edge mats, sickening cracking noise, WS did not move
- (130) DS came in and walked along padded mats
- (133) Got WS on backboard and slid him off trampoline
- (136) WS death was due to his neck breaking at the base of his head
- (141) It was very hard reliving that day, testifying again

Mills Barton, MD - Key Points

- (1) 57, San Diego, played sports growing up
- (4) Bachelors, Northwestern, MD, Johns Hopkins, Residency, Shock Trauma Unit Univ. Maryland
- (9-11) Team physician Ind. Colts, Board certified in Orthopedic Surgery/Sports Medicine, practiced 30 years.
- (13-18) Chief of Emergency Medicine at Scripps Mercy, CV is Ex #7, consultant, testifies all over the country
- (20) Contacted by Starks in May, 2023, a peer-reviewed article in journal got their attention.
- (23-28) Description of article, higher levels of medical care needed at trampoline parks
- (29-32) All trampoline parks should have a EMT Level I
- (33-4) EMT does not reduce injuries, expedites care
- (36) EMT is an additional cost to business, most parks don't hire them, high school kids with CPR training
- (40) If SP had EMT, would not have saved WS
- (41) Better controls over guests and enforcement of rules, keep young away from old, would have prevented death
- (44) Spoke to DS, RH, JB, and SW, reviewed Ex 6 SP diagram, Ex 4 911 call, Coroner's Report Ex 5.
- (48) Can review a case without emotion
- (49) Trampoline parks are inherently dangerous
- (52) Some Ins. Co.'s treat trampolines as greater risk than pool on same property
- (55) Testified a dozen times where Ins.Co. was involved
- (56-7) Trampoline risky, trampoline park multiply risk
- (58-9) Most trampoline injuries occur because people crashing into one another

Mills Barton, MD - Key Points

- (63-4) NIH, 100,000 trampoline injuries in ER each year
- (65-69) No record of all injuries like cuts, bumps, sprains, dislocations, actually injuries are ten-fold NIH #
- (70) Reviewed Ex 1, SP Injury Report
- (73) WS, first incident requiring EMS
- (75-6) Death likely caused by impact to protective mats and supportive springs
- (77-8) Dodgeball and trampoline, increased risk of harm
- (80-82) Nothing in Ex 5, Autopsy, indicates soccer injury contributed to WS death
- (82-4) Death was direct result of activity at SP
- (85-89) Description of how WS died
- (90-92) WS very healthy, no toxicology, should a long life
- (94) Professional opinion Fall could not have caused death wout mats being moved, damaged, not right thickness, WS must have hit springs or metal framing
- (98-100) SW a member of IATP, step in right direction, meets bare minimum guidelines
- (101) Meet with SW, familiar with Ex 6, Familiar with rules, Ex 2, on screen and walls
- (106) Conducted examination of equipment, including pads, not allowed area underneath trampoline, pads 1 inch thick.
- (110) SP exceeded IATP requirements by using one inch vs half inch pads, were worn thin, SW said pads never replaced
- (115-116) Mats compress over time, more important to replace them than seat cushions at house
- (119-120) Without schedule to replace, ability to protect greatly impaired.
- (121-125) Statement of causation making SP liable. "death of WS direct responsibility of Springs Park"
